History

• 2009: the *Wheel of Competences*, devised by a group of EMT experts under the leadership of Yves Gambier



- 2017: EMT Competence Framework (overhaul)
- 2022: EMT Competence Framework (update from 2017) (now online in English, French and German)







Purposes

- promoting the implementation of translation programmes at university level
- defining quality standards for existing and future translation programmes
- training graduates who are fit for purpose, thus enhancing their employability
- raising awareness for translation in general
- increasing the visibility of the profession





A sea-change in translation training

- Translation is no longer seen as an art, or craft
- But as a profession, resting on a set of competences...
- ... that can be taught...
- ... used as a template for curriculum-building...
- ... for benchmarking
- and also for a number of Ph-Ds since 2017

- EMT WG "Graduate employment and future of the profession", submitting the working output step by step to the whole EMT network and all important stake-holders from academia, language industry and institutions for discussion (2015-2017)
- EMT WG CATO "Competence Awareness in TranslatiOn"
- EMT task force "Competences fine-tuning" submitting the working output step by step to the whole EMT network and all important stake-holders from academia, language industry and institutions for discussion (2022)

- Wheel (2009) 5 competence areas: Language, Intercultural, Information Mining, Technology and Thematic, centered around Translation Service Provision
- 2017 and 2022 Competence Framework: 5 interconnected competence areas - Language and Culture, Translation, Technology, Personal and Interpersonal, Service Provision – 2017: 35 skills ↔ 2022: 36 skills

Language and Culture

Prerequisite with some explanatory description but without separate skills.





Translation 14 skills (part I - skills N°1 – N°5)

- Text analysis
- Summarising, rephrasing, restructuring and shortening
- Information sources
- Thematic and domain-specific knowledge
- Instructions, style guides, conventions





Translation 14 skills (part II - skills N°6 – N°10)

- General and domain-specific translation
- Different types of material and media
- Translation and mediation in specific intracultural and intercultural contexts (e.g. PSIT)
- Text drafting for specific purposes
- Analysis and justification of translation solutions (metalanguage)





Translation 14 skills (part III - skills N°11 – N°14)

- Checking, reviewing, revising
- Quality control
- Source editing for processing (tools)
- Postediting MT output





Technology 6 skills (skills N°15 – N°20)

- IT applications
- Search engines, corpus based tools, CAT, QA tools, etc.
- File (pre-)processing and management
- MT systems
- Data literacy
- Support tools (e.g. workflow management tools)





Personal and Interpersonal 6 skills (skills N°21 – N°26)

- Planning and time management
- Workload, cognitive load, stress
- Autonomous and team work
- Social media
- Ergonomics
- Self-evaluation, updating, lifelong learning





Service Provision 10 skills (Part I - skills N°27 – N°31)

- Language industry demands and market requirements
- Client acquisition and costumer care
- Client requirements, objectives and purposes
- Interaction with clients
- Organisation, budgeting and management of translation projects





Service Provision 10 skills (part II – skills N°32 – N°36)

- Language service standards
- Quality management and quality assurance
- Codes of ethics
- Networking
- Analysing and critically reviewing language services and policies

Translation

N°7 Translate different types of material on and for different kinds of media, using appropriate tools and techniques

N°11 Check, review and/or revise their own work and that of others according to standard or work-specific quality objectives

Translation

Translate different types of material on and for different kinds of media and target audiences, using appropriate tools and techniques

Check, review, revise and evaluate their own work and that of others according to standard or work-specific quality objectives and assess the appropriateness of using such tools for the work at hand





Competence Framework 2017

Translation

N°13 Pre-edit source material for the purpose of potentially improving MT output quality, using appropriate pre-editing techniques

N°14 Apply post-editing to MT output using the appropriate post-editing levels and techniques according to the quality and productivity objectives, and recognise the importance of data ownership and data security issues

Translation

Edit source text content for processing using a translation tool

Post-edit MT output using style guides and terminology glossaries to maintain quality standards in MT-enhanced translation projects

N°16 Make effective use of search engines, corpus-based tools, text analysis tools and CAT tools

N°18 Master the basics of MT and its impact on the translation process

Make effective use of search engines, corpusbased tools, text analysis tools, computerassisted translation (CAT) and quality assurance (QA) tools where appropriate

Understand the basics of MT systems and their impact on the translation process, and integrate MT into a translation workflow where appropriate

N°21 Plan and manage time, stress and workload

N°22 Comply with deadlines, instructions and specifications

N°23 Work in a team, including, where appropriate, in virtual, multicultural and multilingual environments, using current communication technologies

Plan and manage time (including complying with deadlines)

Manage workload, cognitive load, stress and critical professional situations

Work in a team, including, where appropriate, in virtual, multicultural and multilingual environments, using current communication technologies





Competence Framework 2017

Service Provision

N°30 Negotiate with the client (to define deadlines, rates/invoicing, working conditions, access to information, contracts, rights, responsibilities, language service specifications, tender specifications etc.)

Competence Framework 2022

Service Provision

Interact at all stages with the client (negotiate deadlines, rates/invoicing, working conditions, access to information, contracts, rights, responsibilities, language service specifications, tender specifications, offer feedback etc.)





Competence Framework 2017

Service Provision

N°34 Comply with professional ethical codes and standards (confidentiality, fair competition etc.) and network with other translators and language providers via social media and professional associations

N°35 Analyse and critically review language services and policies and suggest improvement strategies

Competence Framework 2022

Service Provision

Critically assess and work within the ethical principles (such as confidentiality, fair competition, impartiality) defined in codes of ethics and guides of good practice

Network with other translators and language service providers, including via professional associations, events and social media so as to improve individual and collective professional visibility **NEW**

Analyse and critically review language services and policies and suggest improvement strategies as an extension to their social and economic responsibility
